





2021 Financial Review



















Chairperson's Report



2021 was a significant year for Muslim Social Services as we renewed the organization during the Covid Pandemic. In 2020, the board had developed a strategic plan. Engin Sezen and Rozina Shaheen were hired as counselors in January 2021 to carry out this plan. The board and staff planned to have services in Cambridge, so Farhat Javed was hired in the fall for the increased counseling. Services had gone onto Zoom and other social media in 2020 and continued into 2021. New groups were formed for women, men and children – some continuations from the past. Staff and board formed a group to deal with mental health struggles of youth and young adults. Celebrations for Ramadan needed to be adapted to Zoom; prayers, eating times together, and other activities were designed for families and individuals. Food support was provided to many families. The board appreciated the creativity of the staff during these difficult months.



Chairperson's Report Cont.



In May and June, both Amal Elhassan and Hanin Alhasan were brought back on staff to work with women's support groups and art therapy programs for children.

Humera Javed and Brice Balmer shared chair and vice chair responsibilities. Mahmud Shiblee was treasurer of the board. Other members included Sue Hummel, Khalid Khokhar, and Rihanat El-Alawa. Kaleem Rehman was elected to the board at the 2020 annual meeting. The board met regularly. Brice Balmer was asked to work more directly with the staff during the transitions.





Engin Sezen resigned in September 2021 to further his education; the board then hired Duaa Al-Aghar as executive director in mid-November 2021, seeing this position as administrative. She implemented additional board directions to compile significant information on programs. The board and Ms. Al-Aghar established financial systems which provided accurate information on the finances of each project.

Muslim Social Services continued to be in a positive financial position throughout 2021, due to the successful grants for specific project funding and special funds from Hallman Foundation to assist organizations during Covid. This healthy financial position continued into 2022. The board complied with Imagine Canada requirements and will have a major review by Imagine Canada in fall of 2022.



Breakdown of Revenues



Stages For All Ages



Provided a space for the women of the community to share their experiences.

- Supporting newcomers' integration
- Helping navigating the system
- Creating bridges between service providers and newcomers























Children learning how to express their feelings by writing stories and facing the trauma that they have dealt with.

- Provides children with a safe space
- Can be provided in Arabic and in group sessions for the caregivers













Fathers' Group

Offers fathers an opportunity to share experiences and learn from each other. They also look after their wellbeing and plan different activities and organizing events.

Ramadan Food Drive




- MSS served 2430 iftar meals throughout the month of Ramadan. Our volunteers cooked and delivered the iftar dinners every night to over 100 students
